Where are we?

St Cuthbert (Out) Parish is one of the largest by area in England at 57km². It has roughly 5,000 residents spread across several villages.



The parish surrounds the City of Wells. Its larger villages are Dinder, Dulcote, Coxley, Polsham, Haybridge, Wookey Hole, Easton, South, East and West Horrington alongside various hamlets.

Parish Wards

The parish is organised into 4 wards: North, South, East and West. Although Councillors represent the parish as a whole, they are also Councillors for a ward, with more familiarity, local relationships and knowledge of that ward.

Wards have the following number of Councillors currently:

North Ward: 5 Councillors
 South Ward: 3 Councillors
 East Ward: 4 Councillors
 West Ward: 5 Councillors

There is no central site in the parish or parish office. Meetings are held in village halls in Easton, Dinder and Coxley.



There are sites around the parish which are owned, maintained or kept in Trust by the Parish Council:

- Easton Jubilee Playing Field
- The Green, Easton
- Coxley Recreation Ground & play Area
- Dinder Dragons Den play area
- Dulcote Recreation Ground (of which the Council are Trustees)
- Wookey Hole Allotment site



Nearly a quarter of the parish lies within the <u>Mendip Hills Area of</u> <u>Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB)</u> and are a significant partner in the parish.

Who are we?

The Parish Council comprises currently of 17 Councillors and 2 parttime staff known as Clerks. You would be joining the Clerk's team as Assistant Clerk (Environmental Focus).

What are the Council priorities?

There are matters that the council must do, known as statutory duties set in law. In 2023, as well as its statutory duties, the Council's priorities would be

- **★** Biodiversity Duty
- ★ Greener Village grants
- ★ Local Community Network (LCN) collaboration
- ★ Traffic calming, speeding and Active Travel

As well, there are constant responsibilities of

- ★ Robust & transparent financial management
- ★ Proper conduct of meetings, processes, councillors and staff
- ★ Resident engagement, support & signposting
- ★ Proactive planning input as Consultees
- ★ Maintenance and upkeep of the parish assets



How do we engage with residents?

- At Full Council & Committee meetings

How does the Council operate?

Alongside the many statutory (legal) duties the Council as a whole have, there is also a committee structure. Council organisation looks as follows:

Full Council - the upper-most decision-making body, meeting every 6 weeks and with all Councillors summoned to attend.

Committees - these have some delegated powers (given by Full Council) and smaller Councillor membership but remain formal arms of the Council:

- Finance & Scrutiny (meets 6 times a year)
- Planning (meets every 3 weeks)
- Staffing (meets twice a year)
- Asset Management (meets every 6 weeks)

Working Groups - enable Councillors to focus on more specific issues. The Environmental Working Group is the largest of these and may become a formal committee of the Council in the future.
