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
Learn why this is important

We are writing to support the application for Village Green status for the two little pieces of land either side of the entrance to Bowring Close, Coxley.

This is the only public play space this end of the village; the school playground is NOT available to children except during school hours, (and even then only to current pupils at the school) so afternoons, evenings, weekends and throughout the school holidays many children have nowhere to play, unless an adult is available to go the half mile or more along the A39, along a very dangerous narrow pavement, to the Recreation Ground off Mill Lane.

Many times over the 29 years we have been here, children have asked for a playground close to their own homes, ideally with swings and other play equipment.

I have lived opposite the small patches of green for over thirty years. When my three sons were young they played on these little areas but were also able t play on Coxley school field. Now the school grounds are out of bounds to local children and the adjoining fields are gated and padlocked with no entry signs. The playing field is some distance away along a very busy main road. This small grassed area is the only communal piece of land where children and neighbours can meet for play and a chat on the Harters Close side of the main road. It would benefit from some benches to facilitate its use as a meeting place for our village community which is rather cut off from the main village by the main road. Most of the children in the village are probably in our small enclave yet we have no facility for them to play and socialise. Dear Ms Williamson,

I am writing to express my objection to the planned development of land at the entrance to Bowring Close in Coxley.

I grew up in Coxley, just a little further up Harters Hill Lane, and still visit often. My siblings, our friends from the village, and I, would often play on those two patches of grass, as there was nowhere else we could safely go to play. If this land is built on, it will deprive already-deprived children of even this small opportunity.

I realise there is a playground in Coxley. However, it is a long walk away from Harters Hill Lane (long by adult standards, even more so for young children) and not safe for young children to walk or cycle to unaccompanied, being along a very narrow pavement next to a busy main road which is notorious for careless driving and speeding. Once there, it is not overlooked by neighbouring homes, meaning that if something were to happen, the chances of an adult seeing and being able to take appropriate action are minimal.

Meanwhile the open spaces on Bowring Close are overlooked by several homes, who are likely to know the children playing there, and be able to act if necessary.

When I visit Coxley as an adult, I now have my daughter with me, who is almost 3. She adores playgrounds. However, I have only taken her to the playground in Coxley twice, because it is user an unpleasant journey to go there, even if I know she will be physically safe because I am with her. I'm painfully aware of all the exhaust fumes she will be breathing in along the main road, and in places where the hedge is overgrown across the pavement it can be very hard to get through without stepping out into the busy road. If you have walked along this road yourself I am sure you will understand. I say this as someone who now lives in central London and is perfectly used to co-existing with traffic - at least the pavements in London are wide enough to walk side-by-side holding her hand, and for her to be walking more than a few centimetres away from the exhaust pipes of passing cars.

I recognise that we have a housing crisis in Britain and swift action needs to be taken. However, new homes must surely be built in the right places if they are to go any way towards solving the problems we are facing, without creating new ones. Building on this particular patch of land is unlikely to be more than a drop in the ocean in terms of the housing crisis, but is creating additional problems on other fronts, in terms of depriving children of a safe space to play - children are more likely to play in the road and/or attempt the dangerous journey to the isolated playground at the far end of the village, both of which would be an accident waiting to happen. Additionally, there is plenty of research to show that if children do not have access to safe play spaces, their attainment at school drops considerably and they are more likely to fall into antisocial and ultimately criminal behaviour.

I am not a NIMBY. I welcome the building of new homes, as long as they are affordable to the people who need them, and in places where the residents will be able to access everything they need easily. Coxley I am sure could expand further to home more people - but there needs to be more community provision first if it is to be anything other than a commuter dormitory for nearby larger towns. Currently there is not even a village shop, and practically all the amenities residents need require a car or public transport (which as you will know is not cheap in Somerset) to access them. Removing the only viable public play space at this end of the village will only exacerbate the problem.

When considering this application I would ask you to consider who would benefit from this development. It is surely not the existing residents of Bowring Close and Harters Hill Lane.
